

#### New Year Message from the Police and Crime Commissioner

2015 was a very successful year for Northamptonshire Police and the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Northamptonshire. We have made great strides in delivering my ambition to make Northamptonshire the safest place in England. For example:

- The number of fulltime, frontline officers protected at 1,220
- Visited over 100 Parish Councils to engage in 'Parish Walkabouts'
- The number of Special Police Constables recruited passed the 600 mark
- Seen a reduction of 50% in most serious violence over my term in office
- Tackled Child Sexual Exploitation and Online Safety through announcing my Ten-Point Pledge, committing an extra £1million to tackle CSE and support victims, and consulting with 13,000 young people and parents on the issues around online safety
- Launched a Rural Action Strategy document to promote safety and well-being in rural communities
- Worked together with Northamptonshire County Council to lead the way on integrating the police force and the fire and rescue service.

Delivering such an ambitious goal is a challenging, but worthwhile undertaking. Not only are we increasing Police visibility through augmenting the number of Specials recruited to the Force, we are tackling the varying needs of Northamptonshire urban and rural areas, and ensuring that victims of crime are put at the centre of the criminal justice system to help them through the process as seamlessly as possible. All this is being achieved against a backdrop of increasing pressure on our local services and reductions in public spending. I am proud, however that we have been able to deliver so much and that the improvements we have made are now making a real difference to residents across our county.

As we bid farewell to 2015, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you a prosperous New Year.

#### CANINE CORNER

There has been an escalation in dog fouling in the village over recent months. Apart from the unpleasant experience of stepping in dog poo, with the resultant stench and miserable clean-up operation, there is a considerable health risk. The parasite toxacara canis in dog mess is a particular hazard for children (as well as shoes, think wheels on toys, bikes and pushchairs). Toxocariasis can cause blindness and is dominant in children aged between 18 months and 5 years.

1000 tonnes of dog mess are produced each day by the UK's 8 million dogs, causing a major problem in many areas. One single dog mess contains approximately 1 million microscopic eggs. When faeces are allowed to remain on the ground, the bacteria and parasites in them can survive for many months. Rain dilutes and breaks the faeces apart and they can then contaminate nearby ponds, lakes and rivers and spread into local water sources for all to "enjoy". If every dog owner treated their dog with a worming preparation and cleared up after it, toxocariasis would be virtually eradicated.

This is a very unpleasant problem to have in our village. Of course, most dog owners deal with their dog's faeces in a responsible way, but those who don't clear up the mess – and they know who they are – need to think about the community, not to mention the maximum penalty of £1000, and on-the-spot penalty of £75. All dogs are soon to be tagged, and some areas are introducing compulsory DNA sampling to identify the dogs responsible for fouling, and their owners prosecuted. In Daventry, dog walkers without a "poo bag" in their pocket are fined £100.
