RECTOR'S LETTER – MAY 2017

Easter Day may be over but for the Christian church the celebration of Easter and new life runs for 6 weeks until 25th May when we remember Jesus' ascension, or the day that he went back to heaven. The Christian year can be hard to follow with some events played out in real time - the 40 days Jesus was seen after his resurrection, and then conversely the 30 years of his life covered in just three months from Christmas to Easter! But 10 days after Ascension day on 25th May we will celebrate Pentecost or the coming of The Holy Spirit to Jesus' disciples, which enabled them to go and share the good news of Jesus with others.

Jesus told his followers "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses ... to the ends of the earth. When he had said this...he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight... Then they returned to Jerusalem ... and were constantly devoting themselves to prayer...

When the day of Pentecost had come they were all together in one place... All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit... and that day about three thousand persons were added." Acts 1,2

For many years many us of will have prayed the Lord 's Prayer and be familiar with the phrase 'they kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. The prayer for 'thy kingdom come' has been on the lips of Christians for some 2000 years. Last year the Archbishops of Canterbury and York started an invitation for Christians to use the 10 days between Ascension and Pentecost to join him in prayer for God's kingdom to come. This call to prayer has become an international and ecumenical call to movement uniting people from all over the world.

Between 25th May and 4th June, communities and churches around the world are gathering together to pray that their friends, families and neighbours come to know Jesus Christ. Prayer events of all shapes and sizes will take place across the 10 days, including 24-7 prayer rooms, prayer days, prayer walks and half nights of prayer. Cathedrals, churches and other venues will host Beacon Events, gathering people across towns and cities to worship and to pray for the empowering of the Holy Spirit for effective witness

In our Local communities our churches will be open for quiet and prayer during the day and will host special candle lit quiet times in the evenings.

This will start with an Ascension Day service at 7pm on 25th May at Aynho followed by churches opening in the evening from 7-8pm for people to come and go as they please, to pray, to reflect or just to enjoy the peace and beauty of the church:

Tuesday 30th May Croughton Wednesday 31st May Evenley Thursday 1st June Hinton

Friday 2nd June Farthinghoe

At the Annual Parish Meeting in April, we welcomed District Councillor Rebecca Breese, Chris Wragg from Northamptonshire Highways and Reverend Simon Dommett.

We heard reports from County Councillor Ron Sawbridge, District Councillor Rebecca Breese and Parish Council Chairman, Ross van Geest, who announced his intention to resign as Chairman of the Parish Council at the May Annual General Meeting. In addition, there were reports from the Safety Community Team, Farthinghoe Church and Almshouses, Farthinghoe Village Hall, the Mothers' Union, the Church Piece allotments and Farthinghoe School.

Chris Wragg provided an update on the proposed Farthinghoe bypass. Following surveys in early 2016, it was established that there was support for a bypass from the village and that the northern route was the preferred option. In March 2017, the bypass was accepted onto the list of major project developments. There is still a considerable amount of environmental work to be completed, which is likely to take 18 months. This will lead to an Environmental Statement which will be submitted alongside the planning application for the bypass. With regards to funding, it is estimated that the scheme will cost £1 million just to get it to the point where it is ready to construct. Positive points on the funding front are that the bypass is a straightforward route with modest costs, making it more viable. The likely cost to construct will be in the region of £12m to £14m. It is realistic that it could be completed in the early 2020s, provided there is ongoing support from government funding.

A question was asked as to the likely impact of HS2 on Farthinghoe. Mr Wragg explained that the A422 is not on the construction traffic route, although it was pointed out that additional traffic will switch to the A422 from other routes, due to increased HS2 traffic on those routes. Concern was expressed about the impact of the planned Euro Garages development on the Farthinghoe side of the M40 at Junction 11. Rebecca Breese stated that South Northamptonshire Council (SNC) is against this development, but that Cherwell and SNC have different, and sometimes conflicting, policies.

Councillors would like to thank Ross van Geest for all his hard work as Chairman and are delighted that he intends to continue as a councillor. His strategic approach to matters has enabled the Parish Council to become even more proactive and communication with the parish has increased considerably since Ross took office.

At the May AGM, there is always a requirement to vote for the Chair of the Council for the next financial year, so we will share that announcement in the next Chronicle.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

The role of the Village Hall Committee, set out in a legal document, is to maximise the benefit to the Villagers of Farthinghoe and Steane who effectively 'own' the Hall which is managed on your behalf by the Trustees and the Committee. Clearly there are costs associated with keeping the facility in good condition and generating funds to improve the amenity over time.

Income is generated by hiring the Hall to external organisations and individuals, and encouraging support from within the Village. The Events Committee has managed to put on some great events over the past year or so and the last couple of Film nights have been both well supported and entertaining with some good profits to be shared between the Hall and the Defibrillator fund. Villagers wishing to use the Hall can now do so at significantly reduced rates and with immediate effect, the charge will be reduced to £5 per hour to cover basic costs. Marquee, chairs and tables with swags and chair covers are available for hire at a small charge. All charity events are free, as are school fundraising events.

We are building a separate website which will show the availability and facilities of the Hall.

Thank you to all those who have contributed to and supported our Hall over the past year. The Summer Ball will take place on 24th June and details will follow shortly. The next phase of the storage upgrade will see the construction of the new Bar and decoration of the end wall. You may have seen the request from Steve Sneath for old photographs of the village. This is for a project to create a more involving atmosphere in the Hall by presenting photographs and pictures of local people, buildings and events. Please contact Steve or a Committee member if you have any material which will help the project - no need to do anything other than provide the original material which will be copied by us and the originals returned to you.

COMPOST CORNER - MAY

Happy May Day, everyone!

Why do we feel the need to celebrate on May 1st? It's all about spring fertility and the start of summer weather. May 1st is halfway between the spring equinox in the middle of March and the summer solstice in the middle of June.

The Romans celebrated Flora, the goddess of flowers, in late April to mark the arrival of summer. Gaelic May Day in Ireland and Scotland is known as Beltane. In northern Europe, Walpurgis Night, also called "witches' night", on April 30th celebrated the English missionary Saint



Walpurga, with a feast on May 1st that included dancing and young women being kissed. The witches' night involved cattle being driven between two rows of fire in order to cleanse them from disease, while the Druids muttered incantations over them.

Secular traditions in Britain include dancing round the maypole and crowning the May Queen.

Oliver Cromwell considered maypole dancing to be a "heathenish vanity" and passed legislation against it. However, in 1660, "Merry Monarch" Charles II reinstated the May Day celebrations and erected a huge 40-metre pole on the Strand in London which remained there for almost 50 years.

In Oxford, a Latin hymn or carol is sung from the top of Magdalen College tower on May Day morning, followed by the ringing of bells to signal the start of Morris dancing in the streets.

Another tradition is celebrated by students at St Andrews University rushing naked into the sea at sunrise on 1 May, out of enthusiasm, so it is said, for the change of season.

As for me, I would like to combine all the celebrations together in order to fully protect my newly sown crops on the allotment and welcome the warmer weather. If anyone can tell me where I can find a queen with a 40 metre pole around which I can Morris dance, while muttering incantations, before plunging naked into my water-butt at sunrise, I would be delighted.
