

In early February, the Parish Council requested a written explanation from Northamptonshire Highways as to why it was not possible to downgrade the A422 in order to be able to have a weight restriction on the road. Last month, a response was finally received and a copy has been included in the Chronicle. The councillors did not feel that this gave a satisfactory explanation. The Chairman has subsequently responded to Chris Wragg, inviting him to attend the August Parish Council meeting to provide an update on the next steps in the bypass project.

You will see from another notice in the Chronicle that much needed repairs to Hinton Road will shortly be carried out. Thanks in particular go to Councillor Forbes for her relentless pursuit in having this issue addressed.

Complaints have been received regarding the state of the verges around the village. The Parish Council is responsible for just a few areas, these being the grass immediately outside the church, the triangle on the corner of Charlton Road and Queens Street and the playpark. These areas are cut monthly. Other verges are the responsibility of Highways, and Councillor Morris has requested additional cuts, which have been scheduled, but we are very much in the hands of Highways as to when these will be conducted. We will stay on top of this.

The LED street lighting project is progressing and we are currently awaiting a quotation. In the meantime, we would ask that anyone who has foliage on their property which is impinging on the street lighting to cut this back. Simple upkeep of overgrown vegetation will assist in improving lighting within the village.

A422 Farthinghoe

When Mike and I came to see the Parish Council back in February, you asked if we could write to you giving a more formal explanation of our rationale of why the A422 cannot be downgraded and the B4525 or other roads used by all HGVs.

Firstly, it is important to remember that while HGVs are often seen as a nuisance by local communities, the vehicles and the goods they convey are making a major contribution to the national economy, and our current and future prosperity depends on the use of these vehicles. This is particularly the case in Northamptonshire as our central location makes us a focus for the logistics and distribution industries.

The A422 forms part of an east-west route running for more than 80 miles. Between Banbury and Milton Keynes considerable funds were spent in the 1980s and 1990s on upgrading the A422 and A421 to accommodate the additional traffic generated by the opening of the M40. This included the provision of bypasses at Middleton Cheney and south of Brackley. As you will well know, a bypass of Farthinghoe was also planned at this time, but has not to date materialised.

While there are some notable exceptions through Farthinghoe and on the approaches to the village, this has resulted in a road with large sections meeting current design standards, and therefore generally of better standard than many other roads across the county. To put a HGV ban on the A422 would mean pushing the traffic onto less suitable roads.

Traffic from the A43 north heading towards Banbury is already signed to use the B4525 from Syresham. However, the B4525 is of a generally lower standard than the A422, having limited carriageway width and with many junctions and speed restrictions. Apart

from the section through Farthinghoe, it is generally a less suitable route for large vehicles than the A422, and we do not think it is therefore a suitable alternative. To upgrade the B4525 to a higher standard would cost considerably more than a bypass around Farthinghoe.

Suggestions have also been made that traffic should instead use M40 Junction 10 and then head up the A43 northwards to reach the A421. While this road is of suitable standard, it represents a significant diversion on the normal route, particularly with regards to traffic heading for Brackley. It is likely that we would receive significant objections to such a proposal.

Furthermore, it has to be recognised that any HGV ban we might introduce is highly unlikely to receive any enforcement from the Police, and lead to such a high level of contravention that it question the usefulness of having a ban.

Given all these reasons, I firmly believe that providing a bypass for Farthinghoe is by far the best way to deal with the village's traffic problems without passing the issue onto somewhere else or pushing traffic onto unsuitable routes.

Finally, I know that, in the shorter-term, HS2 construction traffic is of considerable concern to the village. I can confirm that the A422 through Farthinghoe is not one of their identified construction routes, and as HS2 will require all their contractor heavy vehicles to be marked and tracked, there will be much more extensive powers (enshrined in the HS2 Act once it becomes law) to deal with any contraventions of agreed routes than is the case for ordinary traffic.
