Compost Corner

Although many would say that not a lot happens in the garden in winter. I would dispute that. There are still a surprising number of vegetables to be harvested. This year's leeks have done very well and it is now time to start sowing next year's crop, indoors in a flowerpot on a windowsill. Jerusalem artichokes are a very reliable winter vegetable and are in full swing now: see Julia Pepler's article in a previous edition of the Chronicle for some cracking recipes. If anyone would like some tubers to try. I have plenty going spare (have I said that before?). They are nature's answer to that potentially fatal condition, constipation; although the side-effects may be near fatal to by-standers. And then there are the trusty winter brassicas – Brussells sprouts of all sizes, sprouting broccoli, which has now recovered from caterpillar attack, and cabbages. Even the parsley and rocket is still verdant and tempting and my beautifully decorative "crown prince" winter squash, harvested earlier in the autumn, has stored well and is delicious when roasted or mashed.

Now is the time to take advantage of any momentary lull in proceedings on the allotments to get everything ready for the new season. Fred says that sharpening the

cutting edges of spades and hoes is a good job for the winter; a keen blade reduces the effort required when digging and makes hoeing - which cuts through weeds - much more efficient. The local business, "Four Candles", often has sharpening stones for sale. After sharpening your blade, rub in protective lubrication oil for a soft, satiny shine.

Winter is also a good time to plan your planting schedule, so check your seed stocks and get fresh supplies before the popular varieties sell out. And don't forget to get that muck on the ground; I'm using horse-muck this year and expecting spectacular results – so watch out for the Village Show. Talking of muck, don't forget to clean your tools. For those who have tools with a wooden handle, after removing the dried mud, a generous application of warmed linseed oil should be rubbed well into the shaft. Warming the linseed oil helps with penetration and gives a more than satisfying result; who could not take pleasure in handling their tools when they are so smooth and glossy and well-cared for.
