Rector's Letter

It is hard to believe that we are already into May, over one third of the year gone already. Soon we will be heading towards Christmas again, but we don't want to wish our lives away. But how the time flies is not the only thing it is hard to believe and yet there is a reality to it. Before we leave Easter behind, we might remember that the first people who met the risen Lord Jesus found it hard to believe as well. Mary in the garden was so overcome with grief she didn't at first recognize Jesus. When Jesus appeared to the disciples Thomas wasn't there and he said he wouldn't believe what his friends told him about having seen the risen Jesus till he had seen it with his own eyes, and touched Jesus in the flesh. On another occasion we find Jesus talking to some disciples and he asks them "what is going on?" and they tell him, haven't you heard mate, "Jesus is alive!" It is hard to believe yet nearly all of these people were put to death because of

what they believed to be true. It they had thought it a lie...

well would you die for a lie?

During Lent this year, I gave up chocolate as a Lent challenge; the money I would have spent on chocolate is to be given to a charity decided by the pupils at Croughton School. Now I have to say that for most of the time, it wasn't as hard as I had expected, and yet there were many

Now after six weeks I am wondering as I write this, will I go back to my old temptation after Easter is over, or will the experience have changed me in some way. One thing for certain is that having to think about not eating chocolate has made me more aware about what I have been eating and I think that is for the better. And maybe I might continue to lose a bit of weight in the coming months, which would not be a bad thing either.

I hope you had a good Lent and a good Easter and lets see if time will tell if it makes a lasting difference to our lives.

Compost Corner

There are many visible signs of industriousness on the allotments, the most obvious of which is Graham's erection. It went up very quickly, single handedly, I believe; although I daresay Lena provided encouragement in the abstract if not in deed. The result may be

small but it's perfectly formed. I was rather hoping that it would be coloured Peppa Pig pink, to match the fencing around Sophia's vegetable patch nearby. However, Al and Will's advice must have prevailed and it is now an uncontroversial mellow brown and blends in to the background, requiring no petition of objection from the neighbours.



Asparagus season is underway. My plants have so far given me three stalks since the beginning of April, which is a poor show compared with past performance. Perhaps it is showing signs of age? I get stalks in extremes of dimensions; there is the tall thin one, which grows very quickly and in the space of time it takes to think about when to cut it, it has already grown too tall to be useful. Then there is the very thick stalk, the width of a thumb, which is at its best while



still short and stubby. I am still hoping for the perfect stalk which combines the best features of both but in the meantime I need to be content with whatever I can get.

Wap Whipot

1 large stale white loaf

60z butter

4 oz self-raísing flour

4 eggs

60z granulated sugar

80z míxed dríed fruít

1 wineglassful red wine (preferably home-made)

Milk to mix

Slice the bread and break into pieces. Soak in enough water to cover for at least 2 hours. Squeeze the water out of the bread with your hands, as dry

as you can. Put into a deep crock and mix in all the other ingredients—with your hands-adding the wine and enough milk to make the mixture quite sloppy. Bake in a moderately slow oven as the long, slow baking gives a better texture, until firm and golden brown. This can be eaten warm as a pudding, or cut into slabs when cold.
