Compost Corner

Spring finally turned up this year—six weeks late. We allotment holders emerged, blinking, into the sunlight after what seemed an eternal winter. The soil was parched by the cold and desiccating East wind, and the brassicas were scorched by the frost but,in a matter of days, the increase in temperature and the welcome April showers transformed the scene. Potatoes were sown; purple sprouting broccoli bloomed into life; overwintered rocket launched into salad overdrive and the rhubarb burst through its protective bracts into vibrant red splendour.

We are now happily coaxing our pea seedlings around their twiggy supports and willing our carrot seeds to germinate before we forget where we sowed them. But will the birds get to the peas first and what about the dreaded carrot fly? Is there going to be a frost tonight?

Of course, for some allotment holders, such uncertainties are the realm of amateurs. Those with a talent for creating plant shelters and cold



frames from reclaimed glass and wood can look on benevolently, proffering a kindly word of advice to the person who is staring in perplexity at a patch of bare soil where, one could have sworn, there was a newly germinated crop only the day before.

Unfortunately, the optimism of April was soon deflated by a return to cold, Northerly winds in mid-May and, as the Chronicle goes to press, my tomato and courgette plants are pressed against the glass, desperate to escape from the ever-tightening confines of their pots on all available windowsills as day-time temperatures, sometimes not exceeding 7°C, have prevented hardening off the tender plants.

However, enough of whingeing! How wonderful the recent rain has been in transforming our gardens into lush and colourful, miniature (for some), paradises; the colour green is never as vibrant as it is at this time of year. The visual impact of Spring is matched by the almost cacophonous spectrum of birdsong, babbling from dawn to dusk; from the full burbling of the chaffinch, the cheeky chirruping of the sparrows, to the unmistakeable mating call of Percy the Peacock!

Farthinghoe's Foodies

The column about food by 'foodies' in Farthinghoe

ASPARAGUS season, here at last and always worth waiting for. There is little to match the utter pleasure on a plate offered by spears of fresh picked English asparagus, steamed to perfection and deservinally lavished with melted

Often glorified as the 'king' of vegetables for its incredible flavour, an equal honour might be 'herbaceous supermodel', justified by its fabulous good looks – tall, slender and supremely elegant.

The Ancient Greeks and Romans knew that Asparagus was great, when they first began to cultivate it from the wild (it's a member of the Lily family). They gave it the Persian name for shoot – 'asparag', and cultivation became established all over Europe and the rest of the world. The name mutated into 'asparagrass' or asparagus, and colloquially it became known as 'sparrow grass'. Just as well that didn't stick –pity the marketeer with the task of creating an enticing supermarket shelf strap line incorporating 'grasses and sparrows'.

Asparagus is high maintenance stuff to grow, or at least takes quite a bit of patience. From planting crowns to the first harvest is a 3-year wait, and even then it will take years for a bed to fully mature. Male plants are much more rewarding than females—they produce thicker shoots and a more plentiful crop. (I am sure they still struggle with multi tasking though.)

The dichotomous pleasure and tease of asparagus is the shortness of the season – late April through to late June, but it just wouldn't be the same treat if the supply were endless. (I don't count the out of season varieties available all year in supermarkets, usually from Peru – scrawny, pallid stems with as much flavour as a stewed sock).

English asparagus is undoubtedly the richest and most delicious of all; the secret is the freshness. Bite into a spear, and the velvety tip is firm but easily yields, and what bursts forth from those delicate little buds is the sweetest, most subtle flavour imaginable.

In older asparagus – especially product shipped from overseas – the sugar in the plant turns to carbohydrate and the sweetness is lost, so fresh is definitely best.

Asparagus has natural partners on the plate – poached eggs, shaved Parmigiano-Reggiano, hollandaise sauce, for example – and the less interference the better; simply steamed 'al dente' served with one of its partners is bliss. (Avoid red wine when eating asparagus though; sulphur compounds in asparagus called mercaptans make red wine taste metallic.)

To make a change from keeping it simple with whole spears though, I recently made asparagus pate, which was very easy and great for a light lunch or supper.

Take 200g asparagus, and steam the spears al dente. Cut off the tips (about 10-15 cm), and chop into discs of about 3-5mm thickness. Blend the remaining stems with a hand blender or liquidizer till they are fairly smashed up and smooth. Once they are cool, mix them into 200g of full fat cream cheese (or reduced fat if you are virtuous). Stir 100g freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano into the cream cheese mix; add a pinch of paprika, black pepper, and a little extra salt to taste (although the Parmigiano-Reggiano is quite salty, so take it steady).

Finally, very gently stir in the chopped tips, avoiding breaking them up too much. The mix will be quite runny, as moisture will have been released from the stems during blending, but chill down in the fridge for 2-3 hours and it will set nicely. (Allow a little longer for chilling if possible, as this will allow the asparagus flavour to mature and infuse; 6-7 hours is good). Serve with fresh crusty bread.
