

Rector's Letter The Coming of Easter

Easter this year comes early on 31st March and you may be wondering why I am mentioning that in February. But the simple reason is that the traditional 40 days of Lent, remembered before Easter, means that Lent this year starts in the middle of February, or on Ash Wednesday 13th February to be more precise which is foreshadowed by Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day. Heather and I will be hosting an open house that evening (12th February 6pm-8pm at the Rectory, Aynho Court, Aynho) for those who don't want to cook their own pancakes. This is a fun time and everybody is welcome, but it would help if you could give us some clue if you are coming. Any donations given on the evening will go to charity.

Ash Wednesday derives its name from the marking in ashes of a cross on a person's forehead, signifying their turning from the wrong things in life (sin) and turning to Christ. It is also a reminder, if needed, about our mortality as the priest uses the words 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.' The ashes used are made from the burnt remains of last year's palm crosses used on Palm Sunday. This year we will be holding both a morning and evening service to mark (if you pardon the pun) the occasion.

Lent for Christians is a time for preparing for Easter as we recall the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness. Historically this would mean going without luxuries and hence the using up of ingredients on Shrove Tuesday. Today some people still give up certain foods or activities as Lenten discipline. If you want to try this why not give the money saved to charity. Or I would encourage taking up a profitable pastime or activity as an alternative, maybe even one of the Bible studies where you can feed body and soul. The middle of Lent is marked by Mothering Sunday which this year is on 10th March, but more about that next month. Have a Good Lent

Compost Corner

Ruth's Rakeover of 2012

The last 12 months on the allotment saw the full range of climatic conditions guaranteed to elicit complaints from gardeners. The year began after a winter which had been pronounced as "dry", despite much precipitation having fallen. Unfortunately, it had been "the wrong sort" of precipitation, namely snow. A drought was declared in the Spring, a hosepipe ban duly announced and talk turned to the growing of cacti and olive trees. As the allotments are not served with running water, we all made plans to save and store water, attaching guttering and downpipes to erections (allotment-speak for sheds), investing in water butts, soaker hoses and wheel barrow-shaped polythene bags for transporting water from home.


